

With love from the Vicar

My Mum often says of her student days, 'My work was always in on time, but the ink was never dry!'. I'm a bit like that with deadlines including, I have to confess, the deadline for our parish magazine!

So, I'm writing this after our Sunday services today which focussed on Jesus turning water into wine at the wedding in Cana. In our All Age worship we had a 'Pop-Up Wedding' with party hats and special outfits for the



characters involved – Mary, Jesus and the Master of Ceremonies. I always find this account of Jesus' first miracle a real encouragement in the Epiphany season, especially at the start of a new year. Mary puts the problem succinctly, 'They have no more wine'. The wedding is on the brink of potential disaster and huge embarrassment for the hosts. We may be going into this year with a sense of lack or loss, or a sense of feeling depleted or drained. Like Mary, we can turn to Jesus who is able to take the resources, the 'water' we have when offered to him and do some surprising things! In the case of the wedding at Cana, over 90 litres of water, or 240 pints, were transformed into vintage wine! As the Master of Ceremonies puts it 'you have saved the best till now'.

One of the ways we're seeing God transform water into wine at St Giles is in the area of Youth Work. For a long time we've wanted to relaunch outreach to young people, particularly to connect with 11 – 18 year olds and Ash Green school. This was one of our goals in our Focus Area of Mission and Outreach this year. On our own, we didn't have the finance or the people to run and sustain this work. The fantastic news is that, through a generous partnership with our Mission Hub Church at All Saints Bedworth, we now have a new youth worker Kat Beedie who, alongside others from the Bedworth Youth Team, is getting some great youth work off the ground. This includes a 'Youth Impact' club on Thursdays from 4 – 6 pm in the Main Hall, as well as weekly visits to Ash Green School to come alongside students who need extra support. This opens up all sorts of exciting possibilities and will also extend what we can offer to the children and youth who already regularly attend at St Giles. Our connections with children and families are growing all the time, with a particular boost since we've moved into the new vear!

So . . . watch this space and look out for other areas where water is turning to wine!

Of course, no February would be complete without our annual Panto! I'm really looking forward to 'The King's New Clothes' and another amazing show. Do come along and huge thanks to Tina, the whole cast and support team who make this possible year by year – it is an absolute Exhall legend!

Life by the River

First of all I would like to wish you all a Happy, Healthy 2025. May God's grace enable you to see a future filled with hope, in everything you do.

It seems many weeks since I last wrote and leading up to Christmas was a busy time—I had four lovely dinners out with various groups sharing Christmas fellowship. On the Friday before Christmas I had gone to feed Jemima, the river was up a little and she had waddled into my garden. I hadn't noticed that it was slightly icy on the balcony and walking back to my front door, suddenly slipped and was flat on my back and couldn't get up, so had to call out to my neighbours who helped me up and brought me inside and made me a cuppa. Nothing broken but just badly bruised with the thoughts "Jane you have to be more careful."

On Christmas Day I went to Church, not having to cook the dinner, as I was coming to Coventry to my grandson Montell's. It was lovely, as we began he handed Melissa a envelope, which contained a baby scan. Her face was a picture, as it's her first grandchild we are all overjoyed. So getting on and crocheting a shawl.

The river is much the same—two swans, plenty of ducks who enjoy ducking and diving having a good soak in the water, a sweet little moorhen who when I am feeding Jemima sneaks up and takes a bit of feed and then shyly quickly swims away. Jemima is still as demanding, squawking away to let me know she is here ...for food. I sometimes feel she is stalking me as she stands on the bank opposite just staring into my house, waiting for me to open the door and go out.

We had our Parish lunch on January 9th and there was a young man who was walking to the many monasteries around England, he slept in the open air, so we gave him a meal and the ladies enjoyed his tales.

The second week in January we had notification to evacuate; I was quite shocked as the river was quite low, but we had a lot of rainfall through the night and the predictions were not good. So off I went to the Blue Boar just up the road, they made me very welcome with a comfortable room and good food. My friend came and visited me and we spent a couple of hours chatting while sitting by a open fire. On the third day I came home, the house didn't have to be raised so it was just the site that needed a good jet wash. A man at the pub said you must be mad living by the river, that's as maybe but you have to take the whole year into account and take the good with the not so good, and at the end of the day we were safe.

The river flooded the bridge and caused problems as people were driving through it and getting stuck as the ice made it dangerous. The farmer opposite sends up a drone throughout the day so we always have updated reports.

Life settles to its own pattern. I have joined the U3A and I am going to a card making class similar to when I first started making cards nine years ago with my craft buddy Diane, just once a month we do quilling, something to keep the brain ticking along.

I also have been "promoted" to secretary of our Mothers' Union branch so we will have to see what that holds. I wish I had done shorthand all those years ago.

I think it's time to close.

So remember whatever life holds put your hands into the hands of God and he will always be at your side
