

### With love from the Vicar

Our theme for Christmas this year at St Giles is Follow the Star: Calm and Bright. This is taken of course from one of the most famous and popular Christmas carols, 'Silent Night' – always a firm favourite in my experience. But did you know that, as legend has it, this carol was born out of crisis. With its references to 'all is calm, all is bright', we might well have imagined it being penned gradually, slowly thoughtfully, perhaps by someone serenely sitting with chestnuts roasting on an open fire. Think again.



We sometimes have an issue with mice at St Giles. It's particularly vital that we defend our organ from them. Those of you who know this will have a wry smile when you hear that 'Silent night' was apparently written in frantic haste by an Austrian parish priest, Joseph Mohr. Far from finding things all 'calm and bright', he discovered to his horror on Christmas Eve that the bellows of the organ had been nibbled by mice. This meant no organ and no music for such a major festival. It seemed like a disaster!

Undeterred, Mohr suddenly remembered a poem he had written a while before. But it seemed such a simple poem. Would it be too simple for such an important festival? He rushed round to see his friend Franz Gruber explaining his dilemma. Gruber picked up his guitar and, within a short time had composed one of the most beautiful and haunting melodies of Christmas past and present. Out of a frantic crisis, when it seemed that all might be lost, 'Silent Night', one of the most poignant carols of all time was born. Legend goes on to say that the carol lay lost and forgotten for years until the manuscript was discovered in 1825 by workmen repairing the church.

This 'Silent Night' story really encourages me. I don't know about you, but I often struggle to find calm through the Advent and Christmas period. It often feels like a marathon of preparation and celebration. I'm often quite concerned about what I might forget, overlook, what might go wrong! And yet, as is so often the way in which God works - out of crisis can come new creativity, new opportunity and we can begin to focus on what is really important — not all the frills and spills, but the heart of Christmas that is Jesus, Immanuel, God with us. It probably wasn't very 'calm and bright'

when Jesus was born, but a new day had dawned – the light and hope of the world wrapped in the form of a tiny baby.

We've tried to build in moments of both calm and bright into our Advent and Christmas programme this year. Why not join us on Tuesday evenings at 7 pm for quiet prayer and Advent Reflection, or at the Quiet Christmas Remembering on Thursday 19<sup>th</sup> December at 2pm. This is a special opportunity for those who find Christmas a particularly tough time, perhaps through bereavement or for other reasons. Of course, we will also have the 'bright' of many different celebrations, including our Carol Service on December 15<sup>th</sup> at 5 pm and our Christingles at 3 pm and 5 pm on Christmas Eve. You'll find our full Christmas programme in the magazine. We look forward to seeing you if you can make it. If your 'calm and bright' needs to be much more 'home based' these days, please know that you will be in our thoughts and prayers over this very special season.


### **Rev Jo Parker becomes Rector of Arden Valley Benefice**

The service was very well represented by Rev Jo's

family and parishioners from St Giles church, who

were warmly welcomed by the Church Wardens and parishioners of Arden Valley Benefice. Our very own Rev Gail Phillip (right) was part of clergy representatives joining Rev Jo in processing, prayers and generally celebrating the next chapter in her faith journey. It was truly a joyous evening enjoyed by all—a real privilege being part of such a significant milestone.





## Rt Rev Ruth Worsley attends last Coventry Diocesan Synod meeting

On Saturday 16th November the new Coventry Diocesan Synod (for the next three years) met at Harris Academy, Rugby. In summary, the new Synod was welcomed by Bishop Ruth and other officials; ways of working of the Synod were shared; Diocesan strategy overview provided; the importance of safeguarding highlighted; key priorities for 2025 discussed; the 2025 budget approved and net zero carbon ambitions emphasised.

The most important news of the meeting was that this was to be Bishop Ruth's last meeting. Bishop Ruth embraced the role of Acting Bishop of Coventry about a year ago, after Bishop Christopher Cocksworth took up the position of Dean of Windsor at St George's Chapel, Windsor Castle, in 2023.



During the meeting Bishop Ruth (pictured left with Neva) was thanked for all that she had done and Bishop Ruth expressed that it had "been a year of joy" where she had learnt a lot from all. Bishop Ruth will be returning to the Diocese of Bath and Wells after the Christmas Eve service at Coventry Cathedral. Bishop Tim Thornton will then fill the interim role until the new Bishop of Coventry, the Rt Reverend Sophie Jelly, joins the Diocese. On being appointed Bishop of Coventry, Bishop Sophie said: "I am really delighted to be called to serve as the next Bishop of Coventry.

With its rich diversity of people and significant heritage of culture and industry, I know there will be great opportunities to join in sharing the story of God's love with the people of Coventry and Warwickshire."

As one of the representatives for Nuneaton Deanery, I had the privilege of

being at this meeting and over the year have engaged with Bishop Ruth on many an occasion. THANK YOU Bishop Ruth for your leadership, worship, guidance and support provided throughout this year! Our prayers and best wishes are with you and your family.

### THOUGHT FOR THE MONTH

At the time of writing we are about to enter the solemn season of Advent in which the Church bids us prepare to celebrate the coming of Christ; a coming that we recall in the Child of Bethlehem; but most all a coming we wait for when God gathers up all things in Christ; when He comes again in glory.



So let us in this holy season reflect on the coming of Christ who brings light to the world. Let us leave behind the darkness of sin, walk in the light that shines on our path, and renew within ourselves the hope of glory to which he beckons us. And as we turn towards the light, let us have on our hearts all those who see no light, for whom all is

darkness and despair. Let us pray that they too may be illumined by Christ who is our light.

There are two types of light in the world. Firstly, physical light, and by it we learn of our Creator's handiwork in the things we see. However, although that light is very good, there is another Light, a Light so important that the Son of God had to come in order to reveal it, "When Jesus spoke again to the people, He said, 'I am the Light of the World. Whoever follows me will never walk in darkness but have the light of life.'" (John 8:12) This verse speaks of the light of the Truth, the light of His Word, the light of eternal Life. Those who know the true Light will never walk in spiritual darkness.

The Light of Jesus Christ has to be taken into the darkness that engulfs the hearts and lives of those who are not following Him. That's the condition behind having this Light; that we follow Him and share it. If we do not follow Him, we will not have this light, this truth, this eternal life. Physical light is necessary for physical life. The light of Jesus is necessary for spiritual life, and this can be a good test of our standing in Christ. Is this evident in our fellowship, prayer and obedience to the Word of God?

There are two promises here when we follow Jesus. First, His followers will *never* walk in darkness. As true followers of the Light, we will walk in His ways and obey His commandments. The second promise is that we will reflect the Light of Christ. Just as Jesus came as the Light of the world, He commands us to be "lights," too. Like the moon that has no light of its own, but reflects the light of the sun, so believers are to reflect the Light of Christ

so that everyone can see it. The Light is evident to others by the good deeds that we do in faith and through the power of the Holy Spirit. The gospel Light we have is not to be covered up, but is to be made obvious for all to see and benefit from, that they, too, may leave the darkness and come into the Light.

This Christmas and New Year may our lights so shine that "others will see the good we do and will praise our Father in heaven. (Matthew 5:16)



### **WORD SEARCH**

Father Christmas is based on St Nicholas, who was born in the 3rd century in the Greek village of Patara, on what is today the southern coast of Turkey. His family were both devout and wealthy, and when his parents died in an epidemic, Nicholas decided to help people. He gave to the needy, the sick, the suffering, and was made Bishop of Myra while still a young man. As a bishop, he suffered in prison with other bishops under the emperor Diocletian's persecution of Christians.

#### A Goose's Tale
